Seventh largest school district in the nation with over 218,000 students

More than **30,000 students** attend a school through one of the district's many school choice programs

Largest employer in the county with over 23,000 employees, that includes over 13,000 teachers

29 million square feet of airconditioned facilities – about the same size as 14,000 average-sized homes

More than **274 school sites** including 137 K-5 elementary schools, 45 middle schools, 28 high schools, nine K-8 schools, four career centers, four technical colleges, and 54 charter schools



Percentage of schools receiving an A, B, or C school grade from the Florida Department of Education. Up from 84% previous year





Increase in the number of schools receiving an A grade. Up to 62 from 57 previous year Increase in the number of schools receiving an B grade. Up to 42 from 38 previous year

Percentage increase of 3rd grade students demonstrating at or above grade-level expectation in reading. Up to 51% from 46% previous year **14,000** high school seniors walked across the stage to receive their diplomas

28,000 AP exams were given. **1,000 more** than the previous year with an **8% increase in the pass rate**

20,500 Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) exams were also given in the spring, providing our students with more accelerated opportunities. 57.7% pass rate, a 3.5% increase from 2023

18,500 high school students earned industry certifications

20,000 dual enrollment courses were taken, impacting over 6,800 students

- **433** high school seniors received their **International Baccalaureate** diploma
- **1,933** high school seniors earned their biliteracy seals at graduation
- **Over 72,000** accelerated opportunities provided to students during the 2023-2024 school year

Attendance


Adequate time on task with grade-level core instruction (regular teacher and student attendance)

When there aren't enough bus drivers, students arrive late.


Students need a high-quality and consistent teacher in their classroom every day.

Currently, we have 450 classrooms without a full-time teacher.


Students deserve a positive school culture where they can thrive.

Students are affected when leaders leave their school.


Surrounding Counties Have Voter-Approved Millages

Investment

Property owners pay \$1 for every \$1,000 in taxable value.



Value of typical home in Hillsborough is \$306,000.

After the \$25,000 homestead exemption, the taxable value for schools would be **\$281,000**.

The investment a typical homeowner would make would be **\$281 per year**, which averages to about **75 cents a day**.

Benefit

By gathering these funds, a millage would raise an estimated \$177 million to support our students each year

\$150.4 million to district schools

\$26.6 million to charter schools based on enrollment – as of 1/23/24

Revenue amounts are projected estimates for fiscal year 2025-26, when the funds would first be available for use

Must be renewed every 4 years
