End of Medicaid Continuous Coverage

Executive Summary

Since the beginning of the Public Health Emergency (PHE), as a requirement to receive additional funding from the federal government, Florida has provided continuous Medicaid coverage and has not disenrolled ineligible recipients. As a result of this policy, Florida saw a significant increase in the number of individuals and families seeking Medicaid assistance, from 3.8 million enrolled in March 2020 to 5.5 million in November 2022.



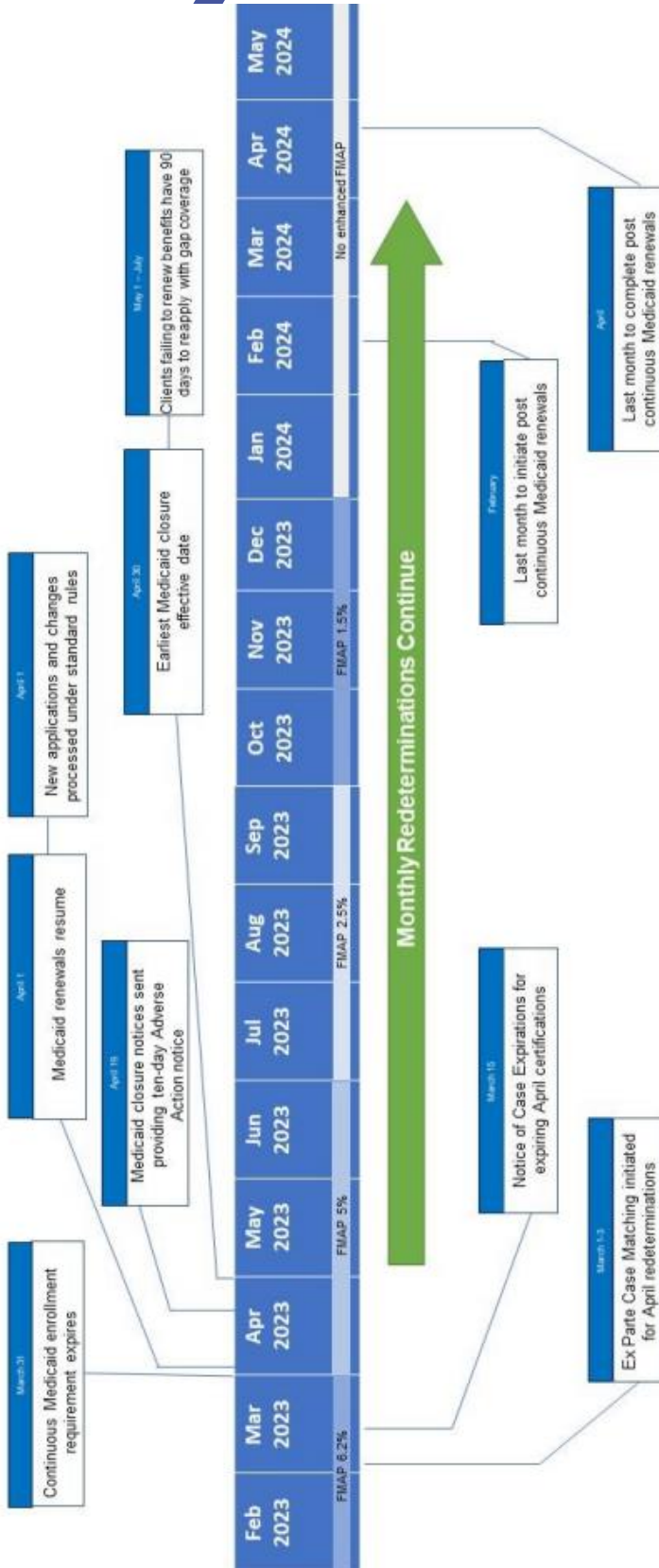
Starting April 1st, 2023, the Department of Children & Families will start to redetermine benefits over the course of 12 months.

The Biden administration [has predicted](#) that 15 million people — 17% of enrollees — will lose coverage through Medicaid or CHIP, the closely related Children’s Health Insurance Program, as the programs return to normal operations.

In Hillsborough County, through January 2023:

- 421,000 people enrolled in Medicaid.
- Of those, 202,503 of them were under the age of 19 years of age.
