Our Pre-K students have been working hard to learn letters T,I,N,C,O, and F! We enjoyed fall activities by going on a leaf hunt and categorizing leaves by their size and color! We wish everyone a safe and relaxing winter break and a very Happy New Year! Welcome back to a great year!



Kindergarten has continued to work hard on learning our sight words and letter sounds. In math, we have learned about sorting and are now learning addition! We are getting ready for our winter break and a positive and healthy 2021!



Reading: Students have been reading a variety of fiction and non-fiction texts. They have been learning how to identify the main idea and retell the text using key details. They have especially loved learning about food chains and the life cycle of a butterfly! Math: Our first graders have been learning new strategies they can use to solve problems up to 20. They are becoming experts at reciting their doubles facts! Science: These scientists have been putting their knowledge to work! Students completed a STEM Fair project and loved conducting our experiments.



Hello second grade families! Our students have been busy, we have been learning so much! We have SIPPED through reading and are learning reading strategies to improve our understanding. Our mathematicians are shaping their way through two and three dimensional shapes and learning about graphing data. In addition we are exploring life through the states of matter. Our team wishes our families a healthy holiday season!





In math, we have been able to fluently add and subtract within 1,000, round numbers to the nearest ten and hundred, and use estimating to help solve one/two step word problems. In science, we have been comparing objects by their physical properties and identifying how water can change states. In reading, we've been working on using context clues to find the meaning of unknown words, using details to determine author's point of view, and identifying text features to learn new information. In writing, we have been identifying the task purpose, and audience of a writing prompt, brainstorming topics, and identifying evidence in a text to write an essay. To support your child at home, have your child practice their multiplication facts at home to build fluency, read independently 20 minutes daily, and log on to iReady reading and math.



Happy Holidays!

Our fourth graders have been hard at work with their STEM Fair projects that they will be finishing up in the coming weeks. As we go into winter break, keeping students academically active is very important! Students can use the iReady program as a private tutor during the two weeks off. iReady is very beneficial because it knows exactly what each student needs to help fill academic gaps. Students can also take this time to read independently and grow their love of reading for FUN! Another idea would be to practice their math facts and writing skills with creative writing. Thank you for all you do and we hope you have a safe and wonderful holiday!



Fifth grade students have finally completed the unit on Multiplying Fractions. They are currently working on Dividing Whole Numbers and Unit Fractions. In this unit, students need to know the difference between dividing whole numbers by unit fractions and dividing unit fractions by whole numbers. They are also learning to draw models to match each type of division problem. After Winter Break, we will start the unit on Comparing and Rounding Decimals

In ELA, students just wrapped up a literature unit covering subjects like King Arthur and the knights of the round table, Ellis Island, the Great Depression, and Amelia Earhart. During this unit, students read a variety of texts including dramas, poems, folktales, science fiction stories, and legends. While reading, students focused on comparing and contrasting characters and settings, determining themes, summarizing stories and plays, and making inferences. This week, we kicked off Unit 3 with science articles about astronauts in space, and are looking forwarding to reading other texts in this unit like journals and speeches.

Did you know...? Our school has a Character Education Program. It is through this Character Education Program that we teach students about Respect, Responsibility, Kindness/Caring, and Honesty. This nine week our students will learn about RESPONSIBILITY. Responsibility is being accountable in work and deed, having a sense of duty to fulfill tasks with reliability, dependability and commitment. Talk with your child about what responsibility means to you. Then provide support and encouragement for your child when they demonstrate the character trait. Assist your child with good study habits, creating good study habits now it will hopefully carry over to middle school, high school, and advance education. Children should have an assigned quiet place with good lighting in the home to complete homework. Teach your child how to plan for what is needed and organize their materials. Teach your child to be aware of what materials are needed to complete the homework. Materials should be laid out on the table where homework is completed. Discuss with your child how long it will take he/she to complete homework. Ask the child after the work was completed if he/she was correct in estimating how long it took to complete the homework. Have your child explain the skill of the homework assignment with you, while you review the work. This will reinforce learning and what was taught to the child.

Coach's Corner


Here we are already in the 2nd quarter of school. Students have been very busy working on some of our basic skills. We worked on

Dear Parents:

We are asking you for your continued cooperation in assisting us to control the spread of communicable diseases. You are expected to arrange for your child to be picked up as soon as possible. Our school clinic is not equipped or staffed to handle ill children for long periods of time.

Please inform us immediately if telephone numbers or other contact information on your child's emergency card changes. The information on this card is vital for the safety and well being of your child.

Please do not send your child to school if any signs/symptoms listed below are present:

- 1. Vomiting or diarrhea within past 24 hours
- 2. Fever ≥ 100.4° within past 24 hours
- 3. Chills
- 4. Sore/red throat and/or congestion
- 5. Persistent coughing, sneezing, or shortness of breath
- 6. Loss of taste or smell
- 7. Red watery eyes
- 8. Rash
- 9. Earache, drainage from ear
- 10. Excessive mucus from nose (runny nose), particularly greenish-yellow mucus

Your child may return to school as soon as all signs/symptoms are gone for 24 hours without the use of medication to treat the above signs/symptoms or when your healthcare provides a written statement indicating your child is ready to return to school.

If suspected COVID-19 exposure, please follow isolation or quarantine procedures as directed by your healthcare provider and/or the Department of Health. Please notify your school if you are tested or test positive for COVID-19.

If your child has a communicable disease, please call the school and tell us the nature of the illness and when we can expect his/her return to school.


