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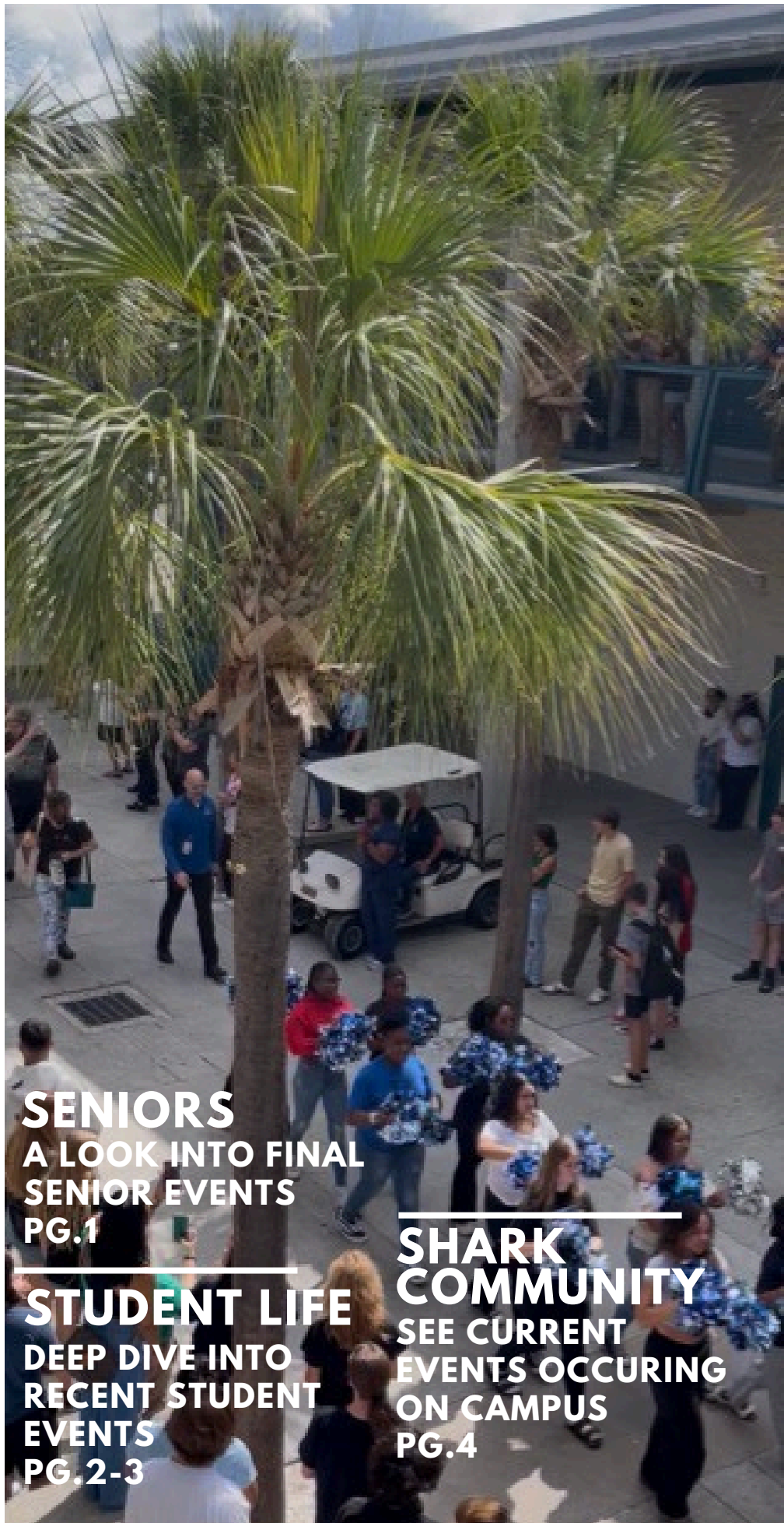

She broke school records in long jump during the Western Conference Federal division meet (5.68m) and almost broke the current school record for 100m Hurdles at regionals with (14.48) just being (0.42) seconds short. "To qualify for states I did more than go to high school practice, I went and did outside training to work on things I needed to improve on," said Fanchi. 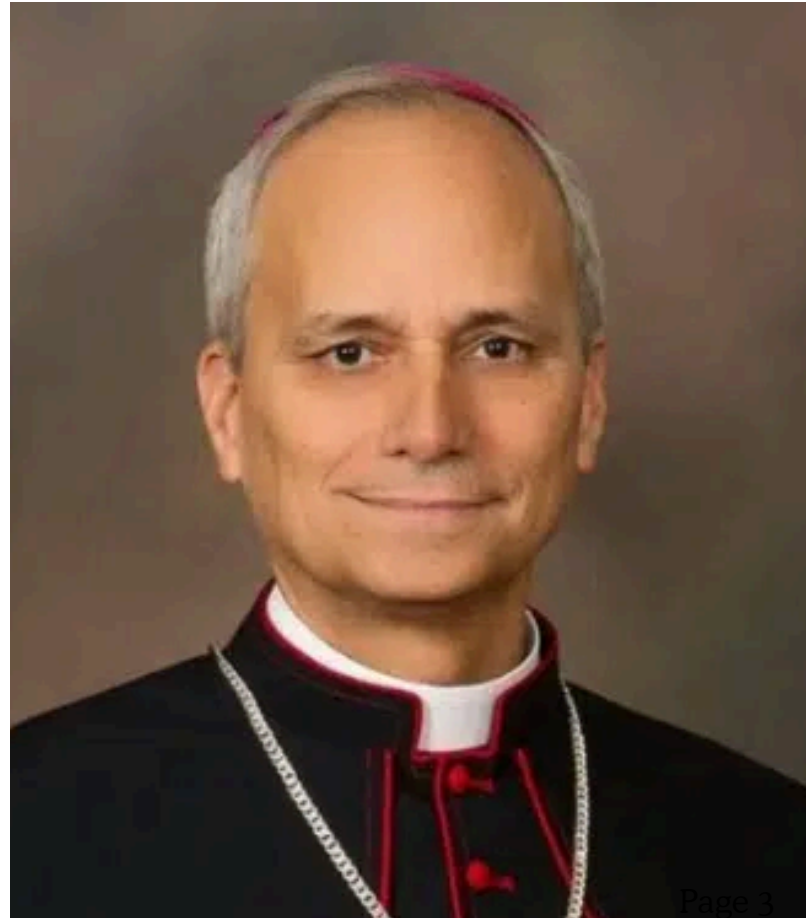

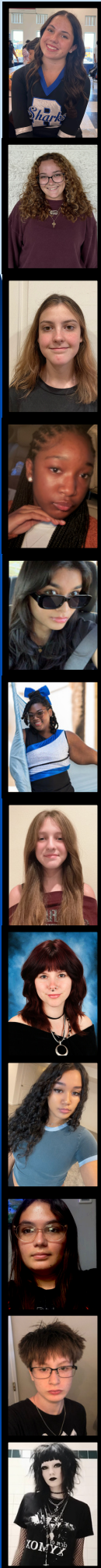
