Choose your actions

Save water: Take shorter showers and don't let the tap run when brushing my teeth, doing dishes and preparing food.	Eat local: Buy local, seasonal food and look for products made with less water.
Break taboos: Talk about the critical connection between toilets, water and menstruation.	Be curious: Find out where my water comes from and how it is shared, and visit a treatment plant to see how my waste is managed.
Make it equal: Share water fetching between women and men, girls and boys.	Protect nature: Plant a tree or create a raingarden – use natural solutions to reduce the risk of flooding and store water.
Flush safe: Fix leaking water and waste pipes, empty full septic tanks and report dumping of sludge.	Build pressure: Write to my elected representatives about budgets for improving water at home and abroad.
Stop polluting: Don't put food waste, oils, medicines and chemicals down my toilet or drains.	Clean up: Take part in clean-ups of my local rivers, lakes, wetlands or beaches.



Directions for turning in your learner profile and global context summer reading assignment will be shared when you return on August 11, 2025.

- Your summer reading novel and explain how he/she exemplifies a learner profile trait. Use specific details from your novel (character's actions/words/etc) to support your claim. Be sure to add commentary that ties your cited text evidence to your own thoughts. A thorough response would be ½ page written.
- Choose 1 global context and explain how your summer reading novel's plot fits into that category. Use details from characters, events, etc and the provided global context information to make a specific connection. A thorough response would be ½ page written.

Communicators


Understand and express ideas and information confidently and creatively in more than one language and in a variety of modes of communication.
