
Middle School: 'The Tunnel'

- Think of middle school as a three-year maturation process.
- Give your child choice and responsibility. Examples of when this can be used: disagreement with friends, disagreement with teacher, not earning the grade they wanted.
- When your child presents a problem to you, try to remain as calm as you can (easier said than done). Ask them what they think they should do about it. Offer your viewpoint in the least judgmental way possible. Do not be offended or upset if they don't try what you suggested and try it their way, and then are not successful. This is how they learn!
- You can try to fix everything for them, but they will not learn how to fix things themselves. Resist the urge (it will be strong) to step in and solve their problems for them.
- Technology often hinders our students' interpersonal skills (and I guess ours too sometimes, right?). It is more important now to encourage your child to try to talk to whomever they are having a problem with. That includes their teachers. You can help them figure out what to say (but don't tell them what to say).
- You will be amazed at who they become by the time they leave here! If parents were to keep a journal about their 6th grader and then read it when the child left 8th grade, they would be in awe of how much they have grown. They would also have some serious laughs.

Monitor devices

Remind your child that words hurt...a lot. This hurt is multiplied when others join in a 'group' slam.

Talk to your child about conflict management.

Teach child to let friends know it's not okay to text inappropriate content or offensive language to him or her.

Enforce consequences for sending texts or making posts on social media that are inappropriate.

Discuss 'sexting'.

Keep conversation open about cyber bullying.

Warn them about strangers/anonymous people.

Parental controls can be your friend.

Ask your child about what THEY think the ground rules should be as far as social media and phone.



Electives


Students are scheduled into electives based on their elective choices. However, students do not automatically get their top two choices. Making elective changes in a schedule is not a priority making sure a student is in the correct academic courses is the top priority. Often making an elective change will change a student's entire schedule, which can disrupt their routine as well as the routine of the class.

How Can Assessments Affect Future Scheduling/Plans?

- 7th Grade Math FAST scores are used for Algebra placement in 8th grade. Students scoring a 3 and higher are placed into Algebra. Students must have successfully completed Algebra and the Algebra EOC to enroll in magnet programs (Robinson IB, Collegiate Academies, Middleton STEM).
- ELA FAST scores are used to place students in Language Arts, Science, Social Studies and determines if a Reading course is required.

What the counselors say...

- Students may experience their first 'B' or 'C' on progress report or report card. Good experience to have most likely won't be their last.
- MOST students mature quite a bit between 7th and 8th grade. They are exiting the 'black hole' and realizing high school is just around the corner.
- Plant, IB, private school, or other magnet program? Guide your child in making a decision, but don't make it for them.
- Take advantage of study sessions.
- Encourage your child to self-advocate they will be amazed at how important this becomes!



What Teachers Say...

- Binder organization is a MUST students who can't find yesterday's homework don't always get a break.
- Keep records via student planner, particularly for projects and due dates.
- Use CANVAS to keep up with grades on a regular basis, not just at progress report and report card time.
- Be proactive about turning in make-up work when absent (this is huge for high school credit classes).
- Come to class prepared to work (both with supplies and mindset).
- Keep up with supplies, especially mid-year.
- Use all resources to keep up. Have someone in each class you can contact if you didn't write homework down/CANVAS not working etc.
- Be present (obviously not when sick). Absences can be a huge issue when you miss labs and new information (particularly important for high school credit classes).
- Expectation is students are to be responsible for their grades and behaviors, not parents.
- Quality work = quality grades. If students aren't putting in effort, they won't earn the A's they have in years past.
