Thank you, parents, for working so hard with your children. We have been learning new strategies in becoming lifelong learners in our community. Our students have shown responsibility in keeping themselves safe by wearing their masks and washing their hands.

In Reading, students have learned about characters (who is in the story), the setting (where and when the story takes place), and how to identify the main topic with key details. In Math, they have learned to count and compare numbers from 0-10 as well as apply measurement concepts and classify objects by attributes. In Social Studies, our students learned about the voting process and even voted on class items such as class favorite color and class favorite food. We also learned about veterans and special holidays. In Science, students were engaged in learning about their five senses and explored sorting objects by texture inside and outside.

Parents please continue to read with your child at home for at least 20 minutes every day. Grade 1

The school year is off to a great start. The first quarter has ended, and we are working hard toward our goals for the second quarter. Our "Book-A-Ween" day was a big event; we loved seeing all of the great storybook costumes. We only wish we could have more of our usual fun activities.

Our mathematicians have been working on number sense, addition and subtraction strategies, fact fluency, and counting in sequence from any number (up to 120).

Our scientists have been working on making observations of the properties of matter, scientific process skills, force and motion and designing boats for our Science Olympics. They will begin working on S.T.E.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) projects in their classrooms soon.

Our readers and writers have been working to identify the main idea and key details of fiction and non-fiction texts. They have been using those skills to identify the central message in all of the texts they read. Students are continually working on improving their writing skills, with the focus on conventions (capital letters, punctuation, and spacing) and sequencing their writing to have a clear beginning, middle and end.

We still have a focus on the 7 habits of healthy people. Learning to show respect and kindness toward each other and themselves. Keeping our classroom communities a happy and healthy place for all students to learn and show their best. Families can help with this by encouraging your learner to follow directions and make good choices.

Remember to check your child's planner daily and read with or to them each evening. Looking at the work they bring home can give you examples of concepts to practice with them when they are at home.





Grade 2

We are moving swiftly through the 2020-2021 school year and second grade teachers are working hard to prepare your child for 3rd grade. Please, please, please make sure your child is reading daily at home and discuss with him/her what they are reading about. Reading to your child is also beneficial. Previous studies have found a positive association of parents reading to their children and the child's reading skills, language skills and cognitive development. Reading to your child also stimulates them to read books themselves. In addition, please encourage your child to practice 2-digit addition and subtraction. We are currently learning about shapes and their attributes.

It is important for you to demonstrate a positive attitude about education to your child. Encourage your child to read and talk with him/her. Studies show that a child's academic performance is linked to their home life and the amount of parental support.



MEDIA NEWS

All library books will be due on December 17th for the Winter Break. There are several places your child can access books to read over the holidays. myON is available through Clever. Students log in using their lunch number and password. Students can also access books using Axis360. This is an app that can be downloaded to any mobile device. Students use their lunch number as their log in. Bruton Memorial Library is also open for book checkout. Students are able to check out books from Bruton using their lunch number.

There will be a Winter Reading Challenge that students can participate in over the Winter Break. More information will go home closer to the break.



SLAM is a reading program for all Hillsborough County K-12 students which celebrates and promotes reading books nominated for state awards.

Students are encouraged to read these nominations and respond to them through artistic expression. A county-level celebration will showcase the best examples of the student responses.

Students are invited and encouraged to read the books listed on the back of this paper and respond in any of the following ways:

Book Trailer

Students may work together or individually to create a video book trailer about one of the book selections. Videos must be one minute or less in length, and must contain pictures, sound, title, author and citations. These elements must have appropriate copyright permissions or be original work.

Students in grades 3-5 may work individually or in a group of two or three.

2D Art

Individual students create a drawing, painting, collage or digital media as an expression of one of the books. Artwork must be mounted on a sturdy material and must not exceed 11"x14", including mat. Artwork must lay flat on the poster (no 3D art accepted).

A reader's statement which explains the inspiration and connection between the book and the student work must be submitted with each project. This statement must be at least one sentence but may not exceed 300 words. This must be the work of **students only**, and adults are not allowed to alter the student creation in any way.


