Summer 2024 Reading—Pre-IB English I

Your first English assignment as a pre-IB freshman is to read *Animal Farm* by George Orwell. Please order/purchase the book with this ISBN number (ISBN 978-0-451-52634-2) to ensure your text matches what we'll use and do in class.

Animal Farm is an allegorical novel that tells the story of a group of farm animals who rebel against their human farmer in hopes of creating a society where all animals can be equal, free, and happy. It has received critical acclaim and is included on many lists of the top novels of the twentieth century, including *Time* magazine's 100 Best English-Language Novels. Praise for the book includes:

As you read, underline any unknown words in pencil; write a synonym for the word in pencil near the word. While reading, consider these questions:

- What things change throughout the novel? How and why do they change?
- What roles/classes in society might the animals represent?
- How are power, control, and corruption represented in the novel?
- What types of language does Orwell use to tell his story? (Describe his language—simple, complex, direct, symbolic, etc.) Why did he make these choices?
- What structure/syntax choices does Orwell make and why does he make them?
- · How is this book relevant today, and perhaps for all time?

You should have finished reading the book and be ready for a reading/comprehension test by the start of school. You should have read the book, have a thorough understanding of the plot/story and characters, and have thought through the questions above. This is a first reading of the text; we'll "dig" into it together in August! Come ready with any questions you have; also, be ready for discussions and other assignments based on this novel.

NOTE: You do <u>NOT</u> need to have written responses to the questions above, but you should know what you *think* about each one. If you'd like to make your own notes, you may. Please don't annotate the book at this point; we'll begin that together when school starts, when you can be shown how annotations should be done. You may take notes on sticky notes in the book or on paper, <u>but only if you feel you need them</u>.
